

# Alburgh Lakeshore Park

Alburgh, Vermont



Alburgh Lakeshore Park was conserved in 2007 thanks to a partnership between Lake Champlain Land Trust, nonprofit Local Motion, Vermont Housing and Conservation Board, and the Town of Alburgh. Supporters of the project envisioned the 10 acre property as the “missing link” that would connect the Alburgh Recreational Rail Trail to Lake Champlain. This new access allows bicyclists and hikers to experience sensational views along the 550 feet of shale lakeshore, as well as open meadows, wooded areas, and impressive flora and fauna. The park’s shoreline has even been identified as potential habitat for the endangered Spiny Soft-shelled Turtle!



If you drive in, park in the gravel parking lot at the end of Town Highway 44 (Trestle Drive). If you are walking or biking the rail trail, follow the gravel Alburgh Rail Trail Extension to the lakeshore.



## Directions and Park Information:

From the south, take I-89 exit 21 toward VT-78. Turn left onto VT- 78 W/ 1st Street. After one mile, turn right onto Grand Ave. Follow for approximately 450 ft and turn left onto Merchants Row. Continue onto Depot St. Turn right onto VT-78 W/ North River St. Follow for about 7 miles. Immediately after crossing the bridge into Alburgh, take a left onto Town Highway 13/ East Alburgh Rd. Turn left onto Trestle Drive and follow to the circular gravel parking lot at the end.
